Christ the King Parish School Educates Richland's Children

For nearly fifty years the halls of Christ the King School have echoed with the joyful chatter of children. As we draw close to our 50th anniversary (dedication of the building was October, 1955), we are anxious to reconnect with all the families who have been a part of our history. Some will remember attending school before the building was even completed. Some will remember classrooms filled with more than 50 students. Some will remember when all teachers were nuns and the then pastor, Fr. Sweeney, distributed each and every report card.

Many will be surprised at the changes that have occurred at Christ the King. The school now serves 465 children in kindergarten through eighth grade with two classes for each grade. There are no longer any nuns teaching here, but the faculty of thirty teachers is both dedicated and qualified. Many of them hold Master's degrees and they average over 10 years of teaching experience. We have a full day kindergarten which offers a rich developmental and academic program. Students in all grades receive instruction in music, art, and P.E. The curriculum is also enriched with instruction in Spanish,

computer technology, video editing, hands-on science instruction and rigorous expectations in all academic areas. We are very proud of our new Orchestra which has performed throughout the Tri-Cities, including for the Mid Columbia Symphony. Our math teams always bring home honors from regional and state competitions, and each student completes high school level Algebra before graduating from Christ the King School.

The building has changed too. With the help of our supporters and a recent grant we were able to equip the school for the 21st century. We have computers in each classroom and internet access throughout the building. Teachers are equipped and trained to instruct students with the aid and the responsible use of technology.

I am proud to say the unique Catholic tradition of our school has not changed. Each student receives instruction in the Catholic faith and its values are woven throughout the curriculum. Students plan and lead every school liturgy. They also take on community service projects with their class each year culminating in the 10,000 can food drive for the St. Vincent de Paul Society sponsored by the eighth graders.

Another aspect of Christ the King School that remains the same is the family tradition that exists here. Many of our former C.K parents return annually for Grandparent's Day. We are happy to see the next generation of parishioners learning and growing in a Christ-centered school.

Christ the King School receives about \$40,000 a year from the Msgr. William J. Sweeney Educational Fund, our Foundation's largest fund.
